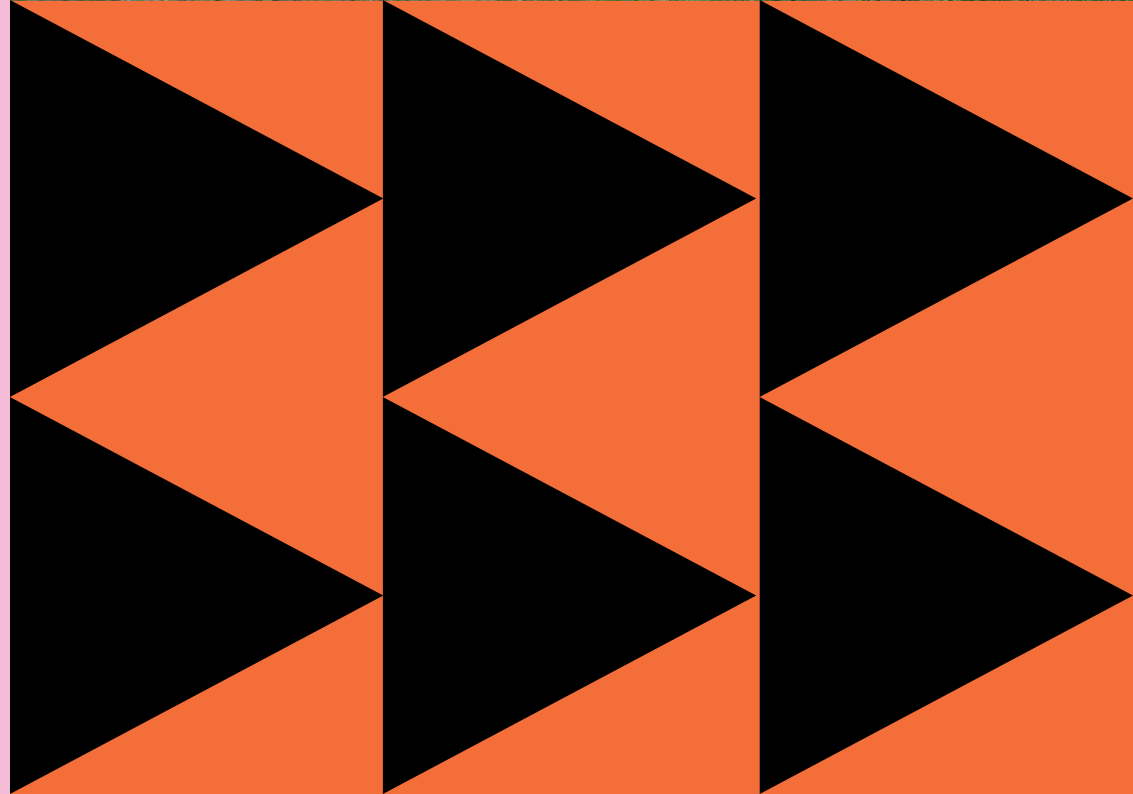

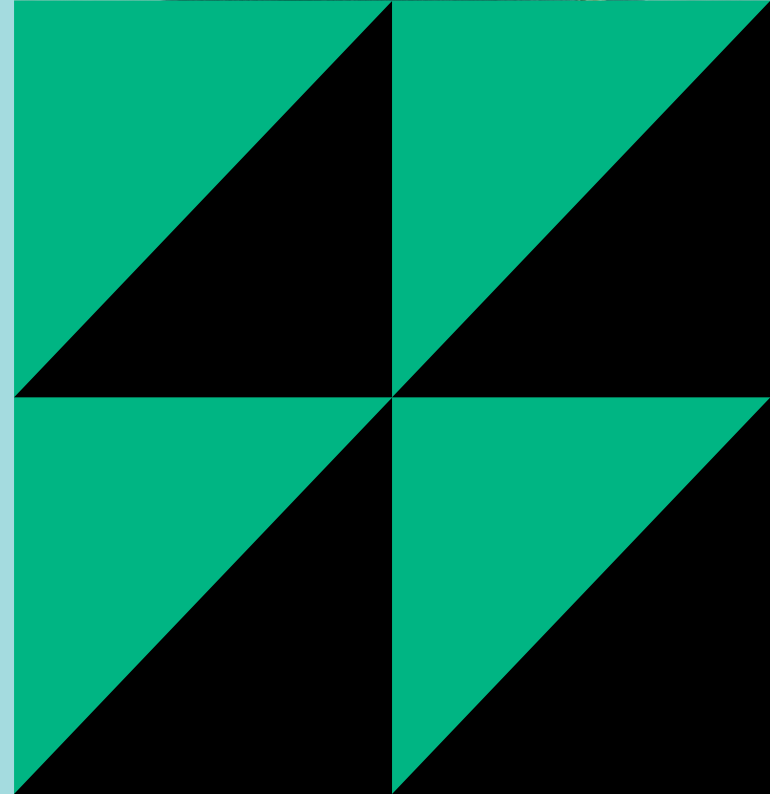


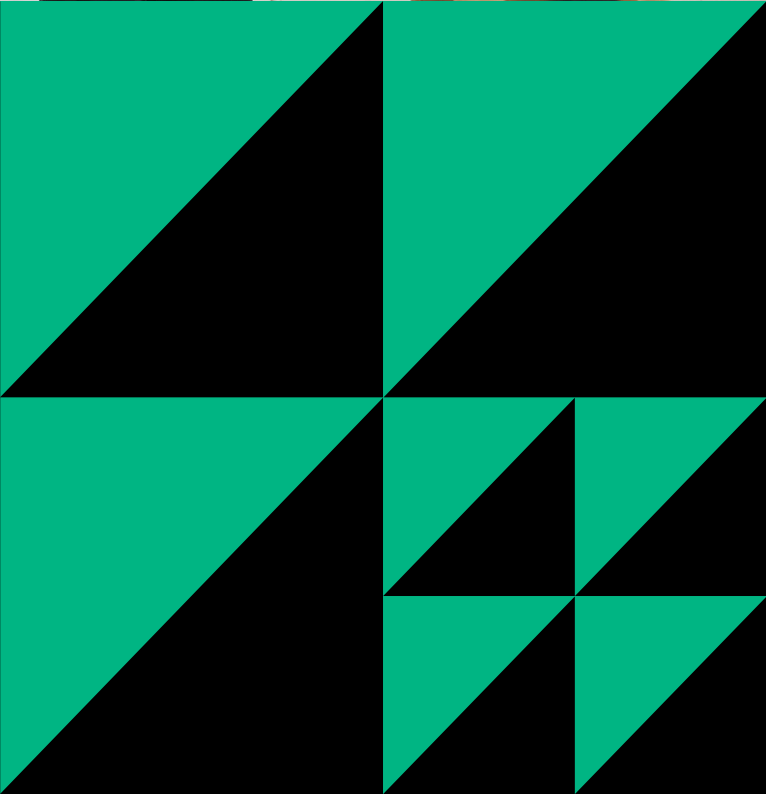

Chair and CEO Update

As we reflect on the 2023-2024 Financial Year, we are immensely proud of the impact we continue to have on the lives of our clients and we remain grateful for the support of our community.

As the domestic and international economies adjust, we have kept our charitable mindset at the forefront, focusing on promoting independence, participation, inclusion and wellbeing for those living with low vision, blindness and other specialised needs.

The generosity of our supporters enables us to provide life-changing support across South Australia and the Northern Territory. Through both government/grant funded and Guide Dogs SA/NT funded work, we have provided more than 6,000 hours of vision services to clients living with sight loss.

One of these clients is Jenna, who lost her sight in early 2024. As a young mum working as a Speech Pathologist, Jenna's life was turned upside-down when she caught a virus that turned into meningitis, resulting in significant vision loss. With support from Guide Dogs SA/NT, Jenna can now confidently navigate her community and take care of her young daughter; she has also returned to work and is completing studies for her PhD.

We had many reasons to celebrate during FY 23-24, starting with our Volunteers Christmas Lunch, where we acknowledged many years of service and welcomed long-time volunteer, Sue Merrigan, as an Honorary Life Member. In March, we held our Guide Dogs Graduation at the National Wine Centre to acknowledge five new graduates: Tanner, Tessie, Uki, Jayda and Jordie. Excited to start their working lives, each of these dogs and their handlers have embarked on this journey together, building their partnerships and confidence in one another.

International Guide Dog Day in April saw our first Guide Dogs Day matched giving event. Staff and volunteers made and took calls from supporters throughout the day, taking donations which were doubled by our Corporate Champions: Adelaide Airport, Beyond Bank, Ord Minnett, and William Buck Foundation, raising over \$250,000! Iconic buildings and landmarks around South Australia also lit up orange to raise awareness and celebrate the day. As we maintained continued growth through our community and corporate partnerships, we were pleased to introduce our newest Ambassador, Darcy, to the team. Darcy is working alongside Ambassador Esky to bring awareness and joy, meeting with partners, and encouraging support.

The end of this FY 23-24 saw the end of our 2022-2024 Strategic Plan. The strengths and successes of the plan, *Optimising client outcomes and impact*, have set us on the path for further growth to increase the number of clients we can support and expand the support we can offer.

We are truly appreciative of our Guide Dogs SA/NT community, including our donors, staff, volunteers, Board and Committee members, corporate partners, and of course, our clients and their families. We look forward to sharing the next stage of this journey with you.

Frances Adamson AC**

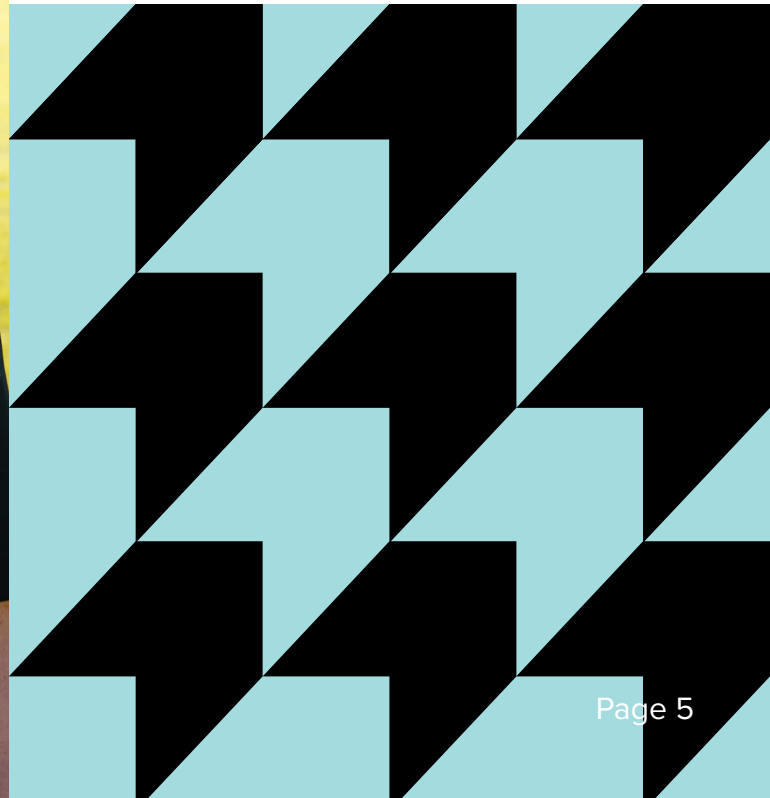

Emily and Tanner

Emily is a 22-year-old university student and she was recently matched with her very first Guide Dog, Tanner.

At only seven years old, Emily was diagnosed with a rare hereditary disorder that makes bones prone to breakage amongst other serious symptoms.

A few years later, she started to experience episodes of vision loss. All of a sudden, Emily would find herself plunged into complete darkness. Emily's doctors decided they would operate to try and save her sight, but the surgery was unsuccessful.

At only 12 years old, Emily had lost her vision, and this would be permanent. Today, her left eye has a single, small area of blurry vision; her right eye has no useful vision at all.

Realising that she would never see New Year's Eve fireworks again, or learn to drive like her friends, was incredibly difficult. But as time went on, Emily accepted that her vision was not going to return and she began to look forward to the future.

“When I lost my sight, I realised that a Guide Dog was the shining light in a really dark time of my life,” Emily said. “The thought of one day getting my own pawfect guide really pushed me to work on my skills and pick up my cane, which is a very difficult task for a blind person, even more so when you're still so young!”

Last year, Emily was finally matched with her Guide Dog, Tanner; it has absolutely changed her life.

“Tanner puts a smile on my face every time I talk about him. Having my guide dog allows me to visit my friends independently, to navigate university campuses on my own, and to just be a more confident person.”

Since being matched with Tanner, Emily doesn't feel so alone. He is the perfect companion to join her on her day-to-day tasks and for everything she has planned for the future.

Esky

As a Guide Dogs SA/NT Ambassadog, Esky is helping spread the word about our life-changing services and continues to bring a smile to many faces.

Meet Jenna

Jenna is 36 years old, mum to her sweet baby daughter, works as a Speech Pathologist specialising with children who are deaf or hard of hearing, and in early 2024 she became a client of Guide Dogs SA/NT after losing her sight.

Jenna was healthy, kicking goals in her career, and enjoying spending time with her daughter. And then she caught a virus.

Jenna got very sick and went to hospital – she had meningitis caused by enterovirus which damaged her visual cortex.

“I woke up and suddenly couldn’t see. I thought that the room was really dark, but actually it wasn’t the room, it was me,” Jenna said.

“I was referred to Guide Dogs SA/NT and I’m so grateful that they were able to see me so quickly, they made me feel like someone was listening and taking the fact that I couldn’t see seriously.”

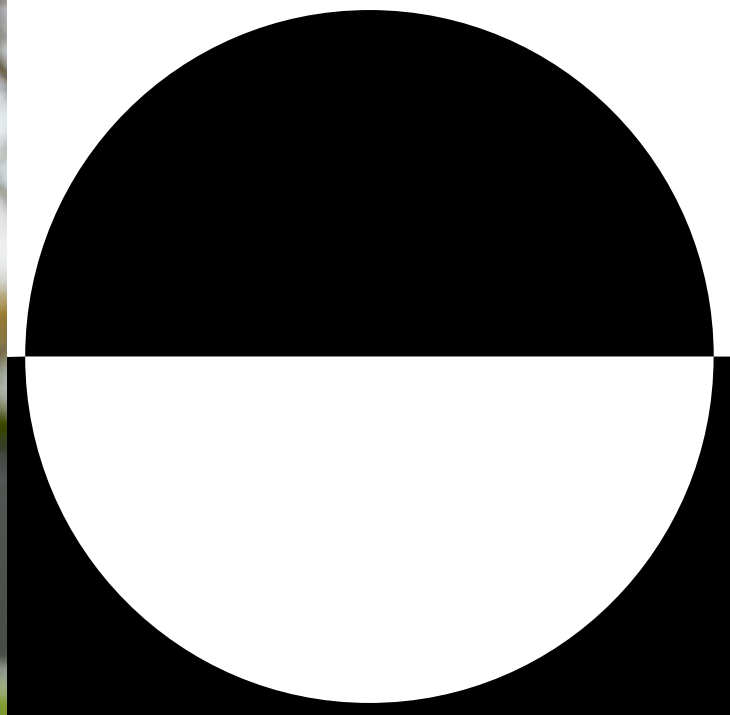
Since losing her sight, Jenna has received a functional vision assessment, Orientation and Mobility services, funding support, and her family has had Human Guide Training. Before this, Jenna felt like she couldn’t have left the house by herself at all. Now, she can go to the shops by herself and take her daughter to the park.

“The support from Guide Dogs SA/NT has given me a lot of confidence.”

When she lost her vision it felt like a bit of an ending but now Jenna is looking forward to everything to come, including raising her daughter, getting back to work, and continuing studies for her PhD! Jenna is moving on with all the sorts of goals she had before, she’s just learning different ways to get there with support from Guide Dogs SA/NT.

“I don’t know where my vision is going to end up, it’s still really hard but I feel like I can do it. I know that I will be fine because if I need help, I have Guide Dogs to turn to.”

Social and Educational Groups

Finding a community of like-minded people who understand what you are going through can make a world of difference. We have an amazing community of clients that meet regularly in person and online through our social and educational groups:

Social Happy Hour

Our fun and educational online sessions provide clients with a way to stay connected and build confidence in a relaxed, supportive environment.

Empowered Living Program

A skill development and education program, Empowered Living has been specially designed for people who have experienced recent vision loss or blindness.

School Holiday Sessions

Our School Holiday Sessions are an opportunity to make friends and have fun while also learning essential life skills, such as orientation and mobility, to help them navigate low vision or blindness.

Human Guide Training

Throughout the year, we provided training sessions to enable over 245 people to become a Human Guide to confidently and safely guide someone with low vision or blindness.

As an Access Partner of Adelaide Fringe, we provided Human Guide Training to staff and volunteers so that everyone could safely experience the magic of the arts. We continued to work with Keolis Downer, who have embedded the training into their staff onboarding process, ensuring that more people can confidently navigate the rail network.

We also provided training to staff at Duke of Brunswick, Community Support Inc. SA (CSISA), City of Victor Harbor Council, Beyond Bank, SA Water, Brain Injury SA, Lutheran Homes Group, Surf Life Saving SA, Tibii Disability Support Services, City of Norwood, Payneham and St Peters, Torrens Connect, Adelaide Festival Centre and City of West Torrens Council.

Disability Action and Inclusion Plan Update

Guide Dogs SA/NT is dedicated to ensuring our range of services are accessible to those who require them. We are committed to providing unrestricted physical access to our facilities and services for staff, clients and visitors, as well as ensuring all of our information and communications are as accessible as possible to all people, including those with disabilities.

Our Disability Action and Inclusion Plan 2021-2024 helps to address matters related to disability access, as well as making services and information more accessible to clients.

In 2023-2024, we have achieved many outcomes set out in the plan, including:

- In-house development and delivery of Disability Awareness Training for our staff by our Consumer Liaison Officers.
- Holding Consumer Reference Committee meetings four times over the year, ensuring valuable feedback is heard regarding the development of initiatives for the organisation and issues in the sector.
- Exceeding the World Wide Web Consortium (W3C) Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG2.0) on our website.

Guide Dogs SA/NT's social enterprise, Beau's Pet Hotel, opened in 2017, and has since expanded its offering to include DayCare, grooming services, and dog training. With our wide range of five-star services, we are proud that Beau's is going from strength to strength!

Beau's is known for its luxury boarding experiences for cats and dogs, pooch pampering in our Grooming Salon, and the most fun place on earth, Doggy DayCare.

In 2023-2024, we expanded our offering again, increasing our training options to include Level 1 Dog Training. We have seen 29 puppies successfully graduate and 20 dogs complete the next steps in their training journey. Beau's Training School bookings sell out quickly and we continue to receive fantastic feedback from customers.

Buddy for Life

Buddy was the name of the first Guide Dog trained in South Australia; the Buddy for Life program is our way of recognising the kind commitment of people who thoughtfully choose to include Guide Dogs SA/NT as a beneficiary in their Will, allowing us to continue our life-changing work into the future.

Meet Buddy for Life Member, Neil

Being able to support young people living with low vision and blindness now and into the future is the driving force behind Neil's support of Guide Dogs SA/NT.

Neil's own vision condition has caused his sight to slowly deteriorate over the past 35 years, now leaving him with only light perception. Having been associated with Guide Dogs SA/NT for more than 20 years, Neil understands firsthand the difference having the right support can make to someone's wellbeing.

Neil received white cane training before being matched with his first Guide Dog, Buddy, in 2013. After his second Guide Dog, Georgia, retired, he was matched with Guide Dog Jordie in 2023.

"I rely 100% on Jordie," Neil said.

"Without a Guide Dog, I probably wouldn't leave home. Jordie gives me the ability to go out past my front gate; he gives me the independence and confidence to be able to go out and do things I want to do."

Neil supports Guide Dogs SA/NT in many ways. He has presented Community Talks to organisations and clubs in Adelaide and Yorke Peninsula, he makes an annual donation, and he has chosen to include a gift in his Will.

After hearing about a little girl who was receiving white cane training so that she could go to school, Neil was moved and determined to ensure support would be available for younger people who will need help from Guide Dogs SA/NT.

"The donations I make each year have been in appreciation of what Guide Dogs has done for me. We with a vision impairment or blindness need Guide Dogs SA/NT."

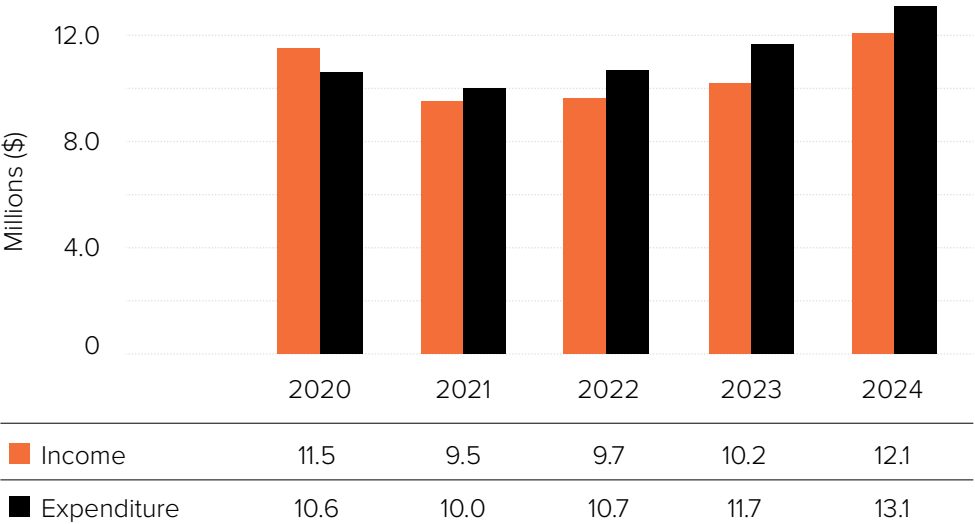

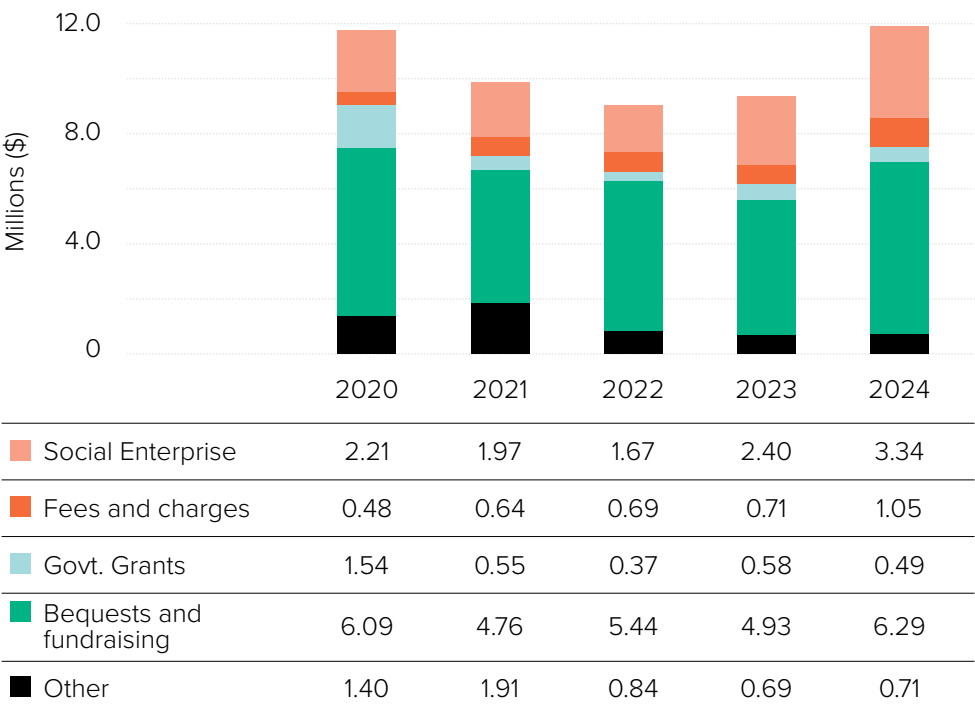
