Guide Dogs Queensland was born when Mr Hubie Morris from Townsville became the first person in the state to receive a Guide Dog in 1960. Six decades later, Guide Dogs Queensland has grown to be a leading provider of evidence-based interventions, services, and programs, to thousands of Queenslanders living with low vision or blindness, their families, and carers, state-wide.

While we are best known for breeding and training our iconic Guide Dogs, our services today reflect a better understanding of the many different needs and experiences of people with vision loss. Our programs include counselling and psychology services; utilising technology and digital travel aids; orientation and mobility training with a cane and other devices; occupational therapy to help people with day-to-day living; and a leisure and lifestyle program where clients develop new skills, social connections and self-confidence through classes such as cooking, ceramics and self-defence.

Our canine breeding and training program is world class, with over 40% of puppies graduating to become working Guide Dogs. We place between 20 and 30 new Guide Dogs annually, with each one opening up a world of newfound independence and confidence for their handler, as well as providing invaluable companionship.
