Orientation and mobility

Children with low vision or blindness are no different. However, they need to develop a different set of skills to understand and move through the world.

Guide Dogs' Orientation and Mobility Specialists will help children navigate and understand their environment to ensure they are safe in the classroom and in the wider school community.





Occupational Therapy

Every child should have the opportunity to participate in all aspects of school life, whether that is sport, music, art, science, or any other learning area.



Using technology and devices to make life easier

Psychology

Children can talk with our dedicated team about anything they like, including feelings, concerns or challenges they face in experiencing vision impairment and blindness in their school environment.

A supportive ear from someone experienced with vision loss and the psychological can be the difference between a withdrawn and frustrated student and one who is happy, engaged, and excited about learning.





For Teachers and Staff

In addition to our one-on-one services for students, we can also work with teaching and other school staff to increase understanding of the impact of vision impairment on learning, perception and mobility. Our Specialists can work with school staff to identify simple adjustments and strategies that can be used within classrooms and schools to support students with vision loss.



These adjustments can be implemented by teachers and school staff to enhance capability and improve outcomes for students with vision loss to proactively engage them in all aspects of schooling. Through a holistic, integrated therapy approach by our Specialists, school staff can understand the mobility, daily living and social aspects that are affected by vision loss to support all students in their learning pathways.
